

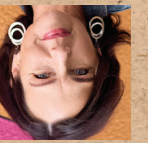
MAXINE BENEBA CLARKE is the author of the acclaimed memoir 'The Hate Race', the award-winning short fiction collection 'Foreign Soil', and the poetry collections 'Carrying The World' and 'How Decent Folk Behave'. Her books for children include the Boston Globe/Horn Prize winning picture book 'The Patchwork Bike', and the critically acclaimed illustrated poem 'When We Say Black Lives Matter'.



KERRY O'BRIEN is one of Australia's most distinguished and respected journalists with six Walkley Awards for excellence in journalism including the Gold Walkley, and the Walkley for Outstanding Leadership. He has interviewed many world leaders including Barack Obama, Nelson Mandela, Mikhail Gorbachev, Margaret Thatcher and Tony Blair, as well as many influential figures in the arts, science and business.



PIP WILLIAMS' first novel, 'The Dictionary of Lost Words', became an international bestseller and has been adapted for the stage, premiering at the Sydney Theatre Company later in the year. 'The Bookbinder of Jericho' is her second novel, and again combines her talent for historical research and beautiful storytelling.



WIL ANDERSON is the author of "I am Not fine, Thanks". He is also a Helpmann Award-winning stand-up comedian who has also received the People's Choice Award at the Melbourne International Comedy Festival (MIF) a record six times, selling more tickets than any other act in the history of the festival.



HEATHER ROSE is the author of eight novels and the memoir "Nothing Bad Ever Happens Here". Her most recent novel "Bruny" won the ABIA 2020 General Fiction Book of the Year and is currently in production as a six-part television series. "The Museum of Modern Love" has been translated into more than a dozen languages.



EUGEN BACON is an African Australian author of several novels and fiction collections. She's a 2022 World Fantasy Award finalist whose creative work has appeared in literary and speculative fiction publications worldwide, including Award Winning Australian Writing, Fantasy Magazine, Fantasy & Science Fiction, and Year's Best African Speculative Fiction.



THOMAS MAYO is a Kaurareg Aboriginal and Kaikagal, Erubame Torres Strait Islander man who joins us via livestream. He is an advocate in the campaign for a constitutionally enshrined Voice – the key proposal in the Uluru Statement, and advises the Diversity Council of Australia and the From the Heart campaign. His most recent release is The Voice to Parliament Handbook.



HOLLY THROSBY is a musician and novelist. She has released five solo albums, a collection of original children's songs, two albums as part of the band Seeker Lover Keeper, and has been nominated for five ARIAs. Holly's novels, Goodwood and Cedar Valley were both critically acclaimed bestsellers. Her third novel, "Clarke", is out now.



ROBERT DESSAIX is best-known as a writer of literary non-fiction, but has also published two novels, several short stories and one play. His latest books include the memoir 'What Days Are For', 'The Pleasures of Leisure', 'The Time of Our Lives', published to great acclaim in 2020, and most recently, 'Abracadabra', a collection of Robert's talks and addresses.



GAIL JONES is one of Australia's most celebrated writers whose work has been translated into several languages. She has received numerous literary awards, including the Prime Minister's Literary Award, the Age Book of the Year, and has been shortlisted for the Miles Franklin Literary Award, the International Dublin Literary Award and the Prix Femina Etranger.

PAUL BARRY is a journalist and author who has written about some of Australia's most powerful figures, including Alan Bond, Kerry Packer and Rupert Murdoch. He has presented the ABC's Media Watch for the last 10 years. He suspects it's high time he retired, while he still has some friends.



FIRST DOG ON THE MOON is Australia's favourite marsupial based cartoonist. A playwright, author, terrible musician, amateur bird enthusiast and Walkley award winning resident of Tasmania, he used to think that wildly left wing cartoons might change the world and look how that has worked out. Oh well.



PETER FITZSIMONS is Australia's bestselling non-fiction writer, and for the past 35 years has also been a journalist and columnist with the SMH and the Sun-Herald. He is the author of a number of highly successful books, including Breaker Morant, Burke and Wills, Monash's Masterpiece, Kokoda, Ned Kelly and Gallipoli. His most recent release is The Battle of Long Tan.



ISOBELLE CARMODY is writer of science fiction, fantasy, children's and juvenile literature. She began work on the highly acclaimed Obernewtyn Chronicles when she was just fourteen years old. Her recognitions include the CBC Children's Book of the Year, the Children's Literature Peace Prize, the Gold Aurealis Award, a NSW Premier's Literary Award and many more.



ANTON ENUS is an award winning broadcast journalist with more than 20 years of experience. His career spans television, radio and print coverage of international news and current affairs in both South Africa and Australia. He is currently the co-host for SBS World News.
